Message from Superintendent Adam Murray Welcome Back & National Day for Truth and Reconciliation



Welcome back to another school year!

As your Superintendent, I believe in the power of Public Education, and I see the benefits that our students experience when we all do our part to support them as they reach for their goals and dreams. This year, I am looking forward to seeing students become more confident in their skills while they challenge themselves in their studies and extracurricular activities. As a team, we hope to instill students with the courage and belief that they can accomplish anything they put their minds to.

Here at the Peace River School Division, we are committed to providing students with a safe and inclusive learning environment. Our educational staff continuously provide many opportunities for

students to participate in a wide range of authentic activities throughout the year that allow them to expand their knowledge and grow as individuals.

In the week leading up to the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, all schools are engaged in learning activities to support healing and understanding between Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples. Many families and schools are showing their support by participating in a fundraiser to support local residential school survivors and their families by purchasing Orange shirts through Sagitawa Friendship Society. Other activities vary school by school, but some examples include participating in the commemorative tile project as described on the Project of Heart website, engaging in Métis inspired dot art, and designing feathers with supportive messages on them to be shared with residential school survivors. Furthermore, the Board of Trustees, the PRSD Anti-Racism Committee and other PRSD staff will have the opportunity to learn from Treaty 8 First Nations of Alberta more about the significance of Treaty relationships. This day of learning will deepen our understanding of the significance of the Board's initiative to honour the Treaty 8 flag and the Métis flag at all of our schools. We are looking forward to continuing flag raising Ceremonies this school year.

I'm excited to witness our students grow throughout the year as they are shown new experiences within their classrooms, and I am eager to facilitate these kinds of events for them. I believe our commitment to creating safe and inclusive learning conditions for all students will be further enhanced as we implement diverse educational opportunities for all.

Free the Horses Self-Esteem Adventure Program is a long-standing evidence-based program offered by the Family School Liaison Program.Through an interactive program, students learn about and

demonstrate improved self-esteem:



Part 1: The Lands of Think, Feel, Do I can do it.

I can choose what I think.

I can choose my feelings.

I can do the right thing.

Part 2: The Golden Spiral of Success: Belonging, Learning and Contributing

I can be a friend.

I learn from my mistakes.

I have a lot to offer.

Part 3: The Keys of Courage, Responsibility and Cooperation My fears won't stop me. My choices matter. None of us is as smart as all of us. My dreams and talents are special



Second STEP Bullying Prevention

Our school community is committed to making our school a safe and caring place for all students.



Again this year, the Family School Liaison Program (Mrs. Kramer) is delivering the Second STEP Bullying Prevention Program in all K-6 Classrooms. The Program teaches Kindergarten–Grade 6 students how to <u>recognize</u>, <u>report</u>, and <u>refuse</u> bullying.

Students learn about the rules at school to be <u>Safe</u>, <u>Respectful</u>, and <u>Responsible</u> and understand the importance of following those rules so that all students have a positive experience at school.

Recognizing the difference between having a problem vs. a bullying situation is an important part of the lessons. Students understand that peer conflict happens most often when the rules at school get broken and they practice how to use their WITS (Walk Away, Ignore, Talk it Out, Seek Help) to resolve these types of conflict.

Bullying is defined as mean or hurtful behaviour that is REPEATED (keeps happening), INTENDED (intends to cause harm or distress), and has a POWER imbalance (is unfair or one-sided).

Students learn the importance of REPORTING all situations of bullying to staff and other trusted adults, and they practice how to safely REFUSE the bullying.

Bystander Power & Responsibility are important final concepts of the lessons. Students learn how having empathy can help give them courage to take positive action as a bystander to bullying.



WITS PROGRAM

- Stands for Walk away,
 Ignore, Talk it out and Seek help
- Teaches children to make safe and positive choices about peer conflict
- Provides a common language children and the adults in their environment can use to talk about and respond to peer victimization


